

ICICLES

Before you begin, I must confess I have had very little experiences with icicles unless it was on a decorated Christmas tree. I read a little about an icicle some time ago and I became intrigued with the formation of an icicle.

The dictionary defines an icicle this way: $i \cdot ci \cdot cle.$ (\bar{i} 's \bar{i} -k ϑ l). n. 1. A tapering spike of ice formed by the freezing of dripping or falling water.

Icicles typically form on days when the outdoor air temperature is subfreezing but sunshine warms and melts some snow



or ice. As it drips off your roof, a water droplet freezes when it loses its heat to the cold air. This sort of freezing, thin film of water is what leads to the eventual icicle shape.

An icicle is water in its solid form or state and it keeps its shape when frozen. An icicle is different from most solids because its molecules are not packed as closely together as they are in liquid water. This means ice takes up a little more space than the same amount of liquid water.

I then put my imagination to work and I began to think of water dripping off of a roof as the temperature outsides reaches freezing and below. So drip, by drip here the water comes looking for lower ground, but as it does it gathers with other drops of water which is also looking for lower ground.

So as the temperature continue to be below freezing eventually all of these itty-bitty drops of water gather one by one to becoming something different, solid, and beautiful.

Now consider this, I would guess that no two icicles are exactly alike, they form in different locations, and as the weather changes they also change. Is this not a good description of the body of Christ? We are all different, we became who we are by the "drips" of many influences or people who have been part of our lives, and as the weather (conditions) change we become different.

I challenge you this beautiful season to be aware of the influence you are or can become as we become part of the ICICLE of Christ's body.

"We are still traveling more than 3 hours round trip to fetch water from an unprotected pond. I have to wait in long lines at the pond in the morning and night times. Scavengers like hyenas are common so women and young girls prefer to walk in groups. Waterborne diseases are common among the infants and young children.

Regardless of the challenges we have now, I see a glimmer of hope because the construction is started to build a new well and the digging crew is busy and eager to strike water. I believe when this well is completed our life will be changed dramatically. We continue to pray for the success of this well."


gift, red/white stripe candy cane, cookies, hats and socks.

Because the public school system had long stopped referring to the holiday as "Christmas," I didn't expect anything other than fun, commercial entertainment songs of reindeer, Santa Claus, snowflakes and good cheer.

So, when my son's class rose to sing, "Christmas Love," I was slightly taken aback by its bold title. Nicholas was aglow, as were all of his classmates, adorned in fuzzy mittens, red sweaters, and bright snowcaps upon their heads.

Those in the front row- center stage - held up large letters, one by one, to spell out the title of the song.

As the class would sing "C is for Christmas," a child would hold up the letter C. Then, "H is for Happy," and on and on, until each child holding up his portion had presented the complete message, "Christmas Love."

The performance was going smoothly, until suddenly, we noticed her; a small, quiet, girl in the front row holding the letter "M" upside down - totally unaware her letter "M" appeared as a "W".

The audience of 1st through 6th graders snickered at this little one's mistake. But she had no idea they were laughing at her, so she stood tall, proudly holding her "W".

Although many teachers tried to shush the children, the laughter continued until the last letter was raised, and we all saw it together. A hush came over the audience and eyes began to widen.

In that instant, we understood the reason we were there, why we celebrated the holiday in the first place, why even in the chaos, there was a purpose for our festivities.

Due to Covid-19 this will be the first time in 32 years I will not be going to Texas. This means I will have to adjust to the snow and cold.




NUTRITION

ELCA feeding ministries grow to care for their neighbors during COVID-19



s businesses closed their doors and states began implementing stay-at-home orders to slow the spread of the coronavirus, ELCA congregations around the country knew that God's work wouldn't stop.

Many congregational feeding ministries faced increased and urgent need in their communities due to COVID-19 and its secondary effects. Neighbors were losing their jobs, and parents who relied on free meals at school were suddenly left wondering how to feed their kids. In response to this crisis, ELCA World Hunger launched an emergency round of Daily Bread Matching Grants. This equipped 200 ELCA congregations to fundraise online toward their ministry of providing food for those in their community facing hunger and matched each with a \$500 grant. Your gifts supported these grants. Thank you.



"You find life by giving it away"

In Huntington Station, N.Y., for example, Gloria Dei Lutheran Church continued the work of its food pantry.

"The way the pandemic has shown the disparities in health care and response in our country, we've got a microcosm of that right here in Huntington," said the Rev. Joel Brandt. "Our food pantry has doubled its distribution. It's the only ministry on-site that we've been able to keep operational, and we did that deliberately because we thought it was really going to be needed in our community."

Gloria Dei grew its ministry by working with food banks and other partners in its community — and with the help of the Daily Bread Matching Grant. Pastor Joel explained that the congregation had never used its Facebook page for fundraising.

"Within a day or two, we'd already reached that \$500 matching goal," he said. "By the time we were done, we were up over \$4,000."

Thanks to the generosity of Gloria Dei's community — and your gifts to ELCA World Hunger — the food pantry was able to serve more people who were facing hunger due to COVID-19. In fact, the congregation was so inspired that they decided to pay it forward — sending an extra gift to another congregational feeding ministry that hadn't quite met its \$500 goal yet.

"One of the generosity principles at Gloria Dei that we've been trying to teach is that when we've been blessed, we should figure out ways to share that blessing," Pastor Joel explained. "You find life by giving it away, and when you've been blessed, you discover that the **abundance in a time of scarcity and fear is a tremendous spiritual blessing to you."**



Food pantries, soup kitchens and meal programs provide immediate support to those in need, while community gardens and agricultural programs help communities grow food to nourish themselves. During the COVID-19 pandemic, your support has been critical to help families keep food on the table.
